'Travelling Light'

The recent outbreak of sunny weather has doubtless had many people thinking about their summer break and perhaps discovering how people in other places celebrate their Christian faith. Phil and I are in that category and we are looking forward to our regular trip to the Greenbelt Arts Festival over the August Bank Holiday Weekend. First held back in 1973 it has had various homes but having spent some fourteen years at Cheltenham Racecourse this year it is moving to Boughton House just outside Kettering where we will be joining with thousands of other people either pitching tents and caravans in grounds that have been described as the "English Versailles" or who have booked accommodation in a variety of local hotels or bed and breakfasts.



Greenbelt is a unique festival but is perhaps best described as a Christian Arts festival. It celebrates faith expressed through all the arts, and it also tries to put that faith into action. It is inspiring, interesting, intriguing and even in bad weather great fun.



In one sense it is a music festival which over the past forty years or so has had acts such as U2, Cliff Richard, Larry Norman, Bruce Cockburn, Bellowhead. This year Sinéad O'Connor, Stornoway, Lau and Martyn Joseph are all playing, but this is only a small selection of the music on offer, you can join in with a scratch choir to learn aboriginal songs or if you are younger with technology there is the silent disco.



But Greenbelt is not just music even though that is a large part of its programming. Each day will provide opportunities to listen to a range of speakers wrestling with the problem of making the Christian faith as relevant as possible in practical ways. There will be representatives of a host of Christian organisations including Traidcraft and Christian Aid all with news of their latest campaigns and a raft of resources.

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On top of this there will also be films, theatre shows, comedians and a full programme of children's and youth activities plus enough catering outlets to give us the chance to almost literally eat our way around the world.



Like just about all holidays, Greenbelt has a financial cost but for a four day weekend the cost per adult, even with a caravan, compares favourably with other shorter music festivals. There are also discounts available for family tickets or group bookings. In an effort to make it even more

cost effective and value for money the organisers have a range of dates after which the ticket price rises slightly. The next small increase comes into effect at the end of June so anyone interested in attending this year can still do so at a lower cost than if they leave it later or just turn up and buy tickets on arrival. 20th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood

All are invited to participate in the diocese's celebration of the 20th anniversary of the ordination of women to the priesthood on Saturday 21st June. This will take the form of a Eucharist in the cathedral at 1.30 pm, followed by afternoon tea in the garden of The Bishop's House.

The Very Revd Catherine Ogle, Dean of Birmingham, will be the guest preacher at the Eucharist. Sarah MacDonald, the Director of Ely Cathedral Girls' Choir, has composed an anthem set to words written in 1862 by the American poet Emily Dickinson in honour of the anniversary. It will have its first performance during the Eucharist.

This is a celebration of the ministry of all who offer their gifts in the service of the diocese, as well as an opportunity to give thanks for the ministry of women clergy. Members of parishes are warmly invited to attend. Children are particularly welcome and there will be supervised activities for them in the cathedral during the service, and at the reception afterwards.

A Sign of the Times

Those of you who regularly pass the Village College, or either of our trust partners The Shade and Kennet Primary Schools, will have noticed that we have some new signs. Common across all three signs is the Staploe Education Trust logo; an image of a tree with leaves in three different colours representing the three schools working together in the trust. Clearly, the new signs can have no impact on the work we do. Yet, having that visual reminder of our commitment to work together, as one, for the betterment of our students, seems to have crystallized something in our minds. The concept of our partnership has gained from being represented visually in a logo which makes us all proud. It is smart, clean and bright, and those aspects of our new logo reflect the way we feel about our schools and about our students.

Exactly what it is that children do at school can be a closed book to their parents. I've no idea what my six year old daughter does all day – I'm lucky if she tells me what she had for lunch. Accepting that perhaps children aren't the most voluble communicators, the responsibility falls to schools to keep parents informed. Some of the information we share is very detailed, such as the progress data parents can access on-line. Some of it is more general, such as the fortnightly parent's newsletters. Some things, though, are very hard to communicate. The ethos of our schools, the way we want our students to share a set of values about what makes us effective learners, high achievers, good citizens and successful adults in waiting is not easy to put across to those who don't come into the schools. To me, the Staploe tree, with its sense of togetherness, of shelter, of growth and longevity, expresses that ethos. I hope that when you look at our new signs you'll be able to see through the logo into the heart of our schools.



A Councillor's Comments

The annual meeting of the Soham Town Council was held as usual in the Walter Gidney Pavilion on Monday 12th May 2014. This is the first meeting of the new council year and at the top of the agenda was the election of Chairman for the ensuing civic year. It has been a tradition that each elected chairman hold this office for two years, and this can be a good practice as it provides continuity both to the council and the chairman, as he or she settles in during the first term and continues into the next. The same is true for the elected Vice Chairman, who continues in that office for two years and is usually then elected to office of Chairman. This tradition is not set in stone but it is up to the elected members of the council whether to follow this tradition or not.

On this occasion Councillor Palmer was elected for his second term and Councillor Fisher for his second term as Vice Chairman.

Appointment of Committees and Working Parties for the coming year: It was decided that these remain the same unless individuals wanted to change.

Public Comment Time: Mr Geoffrey Woollard again brought up the subject of litter in the High Street and Church Alley. It was noted that since East Cambs. had been challenged on this issue improvements had been made, but there was agreement by the council that this was still a problem. Again it is right to insist on having clean streets in our town but the litter is caused by a number of people who simply drop empty food and drinks containers wherever they are when they have finished with them without bothering to place them in the many litter bins provided.

East Cambs. - Garden Waste: In the previous months minutes it was noted that East Cambs. were making an additional waste bin available for Garden Waste only, at a cost of £48 for each year. These can be issued on request with the appropriate fee. These bins have a brown lid, and if purchased can be renewed or cancelled each year. These can be useful for people who have large gardens and a number of shrubs.

This annual meeting had a very small agenda but the Annual Town Meeting was held shortly afterwards on the 19th May. This is a meeting designed for all the people of the town. It is a meeting where the council makes its report to the public on what the council has been doing in the past year. The chairman of the town council delivers this report, but there are also reports given by elected members of the District and County Councillors, after which the public are invited to ask questions from each. At the end of the meeting there is a time of Open Forum where members of the public and other councillors present can bring up issues that concern them. This can be a good thing; both for raising issues and making councillors aware of the concerns of the people they are elected to serve. In the course of the meeting what came to the fore was the vital need for affordable housing and it was explained to us how developers are not meeting the percentage of affordable houses they should include. This is a great shame because all councillors are now acutely aware of how great the need is, in the past there were protests about developments around and about us, but here in our community there is a need for affordable housing for local people to keep them here. There is a scheme now set up in Soham to be the means whereby land can be used to build houses, allocate and manage them for local people who fit the criteria. It is a Community Land Trust called Thrift and it is very eager to find land available to make a start. There was some concern expressed as to whether Soham was growing too fast, but it was felt we need the housing to keep people here. Apart from councillors, it was reckoned there were ten members of public present and it is somewhat disappointing that more people were not there to hear what their elected people had done for them, and conversely let the elected councillors what they would like them to do for them.
