Care for God's creation

"The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it."

(Genesis 2:15)

I have been an environmental campaigner since I reached the age of retirement. In the 2000s I spent nearly 6 years as treasurer of Christian Ecology Link (now known as Green Christian) and took part in protests (including some civil disobedience) against the construction of a third runway at Heathrow Airport. More recently I was leading a U3A botany group in Ely.

One of the activities I encouraged in the botany group was the recording of occurrences of our precious wild flowers, as an aid to government and local authorities and other organisations making decisions about nature conservation. Adam was commanded to keep the garden of Eden, that is, to conserve it.

As I write this, the earth is undergoing a mass extinction of all kinds of wildlife. This has happened more than once in the past history of the earth, but this time the decline of species is due to human activity. Global warming (see below) is driving species away from the equator often with nowhere to go because of natural barriers, and there are other ways in which we humans are responsible. Our atmosphere is polluted due to the burning of fossil fuels, especially by the exhaust fumes of private cars, which pollutes the soil. Then there is the runoff from industrial farming of various agrichemicals, polluting natural soils, rivers and other bodies of water. More and more land is taken up with monocultures such as oil palms, soya beans and maize, driving wildlife into smaller and smaller refuges, which cannot maintain a variety of wildlife. Lastly, there is activity under the general heading of the poaching of rare and declining species such as whales (but some recent good news about the blue whale), "big game" and fish stocks. (Another piece of good news is that the demand for shark fin is rapidly dropping!)

Why demonstrate against the construction of a third runway at Heathrow? In the UK, of the "domestic" consumption of fossil fuels in the travel sector, nearly two thirds is by private vehicles and nearly one third is by the airlines. Far less fossil fuel is consumed by bus and rail travel, and none by cyclists and walkers!

On the controversial issue of global warming, there is increasing evidence that it is mostly due to human activity. I understand that the greenhouse effect is the effect of so-called greenhouse gases, mainly carbon dioxide and methane (and water vapour), which trap some of the sun's rays on the surface of the earth instead of being reflected into outer space. These gases are emitted through the burning of fossil fuels. Before the coming of humankind on the earth there was a balance between incoming radiation from the sun and outgoing radiation from the earth, which maintained the earth at a surface temperature suitable for the flourishing of living creatures. Humans have been upsetting this balance by clearing forests, burning fossil fuels and intensively rearing livestock, thereby putting greenhouse gases into the atmosphere.

The great majority of scientists now believe that the evidence for human-induced global warming is overwhelming.

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A Thrift Community Land Trust for Soham

A Community Land Trust is a community led organisation that provides land and buildings to meet the long term needs of its community. It offers a way to provide permanently affordable housing as well as other things the community needs like meeting spaces, workspaces, shops, pubs, farms and gardens. It holds these assets in trust so the community benefits forever.



We have already obtained information about housing numbers for Soham. Last year there were 96 families from Soham looking for affordable housing. Unfortunately the way in which the housing lists work does not guarantee that Soham families will necessarily be offered properties in Soham at prices which they can afford. The proposed development in the Eastern Gateway offers an ideal opportunity to address this problem by forming a community land trust in Soham. A local CLT will be able to take an active part in improving the standards of affordable housing and how it is delivered in Soham.

A small group of us approached Foundations East who have been involved in CLTs for a number of years, both at government and local level, and asked for guidance. We have had a number of meetings over the last 14 months and have now set up a CLT in Soham called the Thrift Community Land Trust for Soham. We sought support from East Cambs District Council and Soham Town Council for the setting up of a local CLT and they have both provided some funding for start up costs.

We are now looking for support from the local community, in particular from people who may have a special interest in housing in Soham. We are also seeking help from anyone who may be interested or has some expertise to help in this setting up period.

The most important thing to remember about a CLT is that it is a non profit making organisation, set up by local people, run by local people to address local issues by providing solutions which meet that need locally. All its assets are owned in perpetuity by the trust. We will be seeking members at a charge of £1 for life. Membership will allow one vote in the election of the board of trustees and an opportunity to influence the way in which the Trust is run. Anyone can be a member and once we have people living in our houses we hope they will become active members too.

We are seeking the opinions of as many different people in the community and we would very much like the opportunity to speak to local groups and explain what we are trying to do. If you know of a group who would like to invite us to speak to them please get in touch.

The website listed above is still very new but we are adding to it as we go along.

A Councillor's Comments

At our September meeting we had two people making use of Public Comment Time. Patricia Law presented a plea that the council should consider providing a formal park for the town. She appreciated that we have a recreation ground, which serves a useful purpose, but a formal park was different and set out with flower beds, and which were a feature of the Victorian era and are present in most towns today. So she asked if a piece of land became available that the council would consider using it to provide such a park. Geoffrey Woollard spoke about the speed of development in Soham and felt that it was going too fast.

Chairman's Announcements: These included the Pumpkin Fair on 27th September, but also mentioned a meeting on the 15th October dealing with the Eastern Gateway which he said appeared to be making some progress.

"Lest We Forget" 3rd August 2014: Councillor Woodbridge gave his report on this event which had taken place, which had been a fitting commemoration for the start of world war one. He thanked everyone who had worked to make the whole event possible, and finally thanked the Soham people for their wonderful response for without them the event would not have been the success it was. The council thanked councillor Woodbridge for his leading role in organising the event.

Report on the East Cambridgeshire Parish Conference: All councillors were given a detailed printed report by councillor Aitchison who attended this event on 1st September 2014. There were presentations given on Superfast Broadband, Rural Affordable Housing, Policing, and an interesting presentation from Swaffham Prior having consulted the people of the Parish on how best to use the £12K section 106 money. They did this by improving the green space in the centre of the village and opening up a piece of neglected woodland for the public. Apart from the presentations there were organisations on hand to show what they do. These included Neighbourhood Watch, Care in the Community, Volunteer Center and many more.

Applications For Financial Support: East Anglia's Children's Hospice, Ely & Soham Dial-A-Ride, Cambridge Relate and Soham Twinning Association. Three of these were granted support but Ely & Soham Dial-A-Ride, because of certain queries, were put on hold until the manager of the scheme can come and present their need at a future meeting.

I'm nearly as old as Tim (and just as young looking, I hope) and for the last 4½ years I've been living here in Soham with my husband Andy, an accountant, and my sons Lars (16) and Nils (14), who are both at Soham Village College.



I love working with and for children and young people. Hence, I've been involved in children's and youth work ever since my own children were small. More recently, I've been Reading Tutor at St. Andrew's Primary School, Parent Governor at Soham Village College and a volunteer at Highfield Special School, supporting young people to learn through dance, which is a passion of mine.
